Introduction

1. Context and Background

- Scripture Reading: Acts 17:16-17
 - Paul is provoked by the idolatry in Athens.

 - Opposition arises, causing an uproar in Thessalonica.
- Acts 17:10-12:

• Paul and Silas sent to Berea, where they find the Bereans more fairminded, searching the scriptures daily.

4. Paul's Anger in Athens

- Acts 17:15-17:
 - Paul's spirit is provoked by the idolatry in Athens.
 - Explanation of the Greek term for "provoked" (cut to the heart).
 - Comparison to modern-day injustices (e.g., child abuse and societal moral decline).

5. Contemporary Application

- Moral Decline:
 - Removal of prayer from schools in 1962 and its correlation with increased societal issues (e.g., violent crime, single-parent households).
 - Importance of Christians speaking out against moral wrongs.

Critical Thinking:

- Modern education's focus on what to think rather than how to think.
- Example of students' lack of understanding regarding current political slogans.

6. Call to Action

- Christian Responsibility:
 - Encouragement for Christians to speak the truth in love.
 - Importance of standing firm in faith and reasoning with others, just as Paul did.

Conclusion

- Final Encouragement:
 - Reminder of the eternal perspective and the importance of sharing the Gospel lovingly and boldly.
